In this painting I created faces to represent some of the 750,000 victims, from the oldest to the youngest. The oldest over 100 and the youngest was less than one year old. Faces we can all associate with in our lives. I did not use real victims because I felt it would be too painful for those families. Lynn lost a sister, Gale, in this war so we are much aware of it's cost to numerous families.

In wars there are always casualties. We knew last year our enemy was coming. DNA analysis determined the virus was highly contagious and spread by air and attacked the lungs. In this attack, no bombs were dropped no ships sank, no invading forces seen. In February we had time to plan a defense. Wear mask, stay six feet apart, avoid crowds, and wash hands often. Work began on a vaccine to control the virus.

Many believed there was no invasion, and refused to wear mask, and continued business as usual. Through ignorance and false information, they spread the virus. No serious action was taken and . . . the Cavalry never came.

Our leaders didn't lead. Scientists were silenced, and the Center of Disease Control, was muffled and handcuffed and we received no accurate information. The public was misinformed. Told it was a hoax and nothing but the "flu". That it would be over in a few days or weeks. The death total continued to rise, hitting nursing homes first. Then, the old, the young, and those of color, and anyone with health problems.
